<p>CIS 110 Introduction to Computers</p> <p>Prerequisites: None</p> <p>Corequisites: None</p> <p>This course introduces computer concepts, including fundamental functions and operations of the computer. <p>CIS 111 Basic PC Literacy</p> <p>Prerequisites: None</p> <p>Corequisites: None</p> <p>This course provides an overview of computer concepts. Emphasis is placed on the use of personal computers and software applications for personal and fundamental workplace use. <p>CIS 115 Introduction to Programming & Logic</p> <p>Prerequisites: Take one set: Set 1: DMA 010, DMA 020, DMA 030, and DMA 040 Set 2: DMA 025 and DMA 040 Set 3: MAT 121 Set 4: MAT 171 Set 5: MAT 003</p> <p>Corequisites: None</p> <p>This course introduces computer programming and problem solving in a structured program logic environment. Topics include language syntax, data types, program organization, problem solving methods, algorithm design, and logic control structures. Upon completion, students should be able to use top-down algorithm design, and implement algorithmic solutions in a programming language. <i>This course has been approved for transfer under the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement as a general education course in Mathematics (Quantitative).</i></p>	2	3	0	0	3
<p>CJC 111 Intro to Criminal Justice</p> <p>Prerequisites: None</p> <p>Corequisites: None</p> <p>This course introduces the components and processes of the criminal justice system. Topics include history, structure, functions, and philosophy of the criminal justice system and their relationship to life in our society. <p>CJC 112 Criminology</p> <p>Prerequisites: None</p> <p>Corequisites: None</p> <p>This course introduces deviant behavior as it relates to criminal activity.
